


Speechless Kate Darbishire (b 1962)


Speechless Kate Darbishire (b 1962)

In 2003 2006, with four young children at home, Kate attended Bath Spa University, studying Creative Writing and Education. Her only regret is not opting for just Writing as it soon became apparent that Education as a future career was no fairytale!
- She said 'I wanted people with Cerebral Palsy to have a book where they could see themselves.'
- Did you know? One of her daughters, who has Cerebral Palsy, couldn't walk at four years old and had no speech. She had used sign language from nine months but made almost no noise at all. Kate took her on an amazing speech and language course and finally realised how to help her speak. It was a slow process, but now that little girl is twenty. She can walk and she never stops talking.

Ready – arrive promptly and settle quickly at the start of the session

 Respectful – listen, in silence, to their tutor and visiting adults reading



 Safe – follow instructions from staff, first time every time, including tracking the text with their reading ruler, and sitting with good posture
