
Noughts and Crosses Malorie Blackman (b 1962)




Noughts and Crosses Malorie Blackman (b 1962)

- Malorie Blackman OBE is a British writer who held the position of Children's Laureate from 2013 to 2015. She primarily writes literature and television drama for children and young adults. She has used science fiction to explore social and ethical issues.
- She said of Noughts and Crosses... "It's all based on true stuff. The things [Callum] goes through particularly in school happened to me, like asking my teachers where the black scientists were on the curriculum and being told there weren't any. Or my first time in first class on a train and being accused of stealing the ticket."
- Did you know? Blackman was born in Clapham, London. Her parents were both from Barbados. At school, she wanted to be an English teacher, but she grew up to become a systems programmer instead. She earned an HNC at Thames Polytechnic and is a graduate of the National Film and Television School
